





ACCREDITATION



SACFD provides an all-hazards approach to protecting the lives and property of South Adams County, Colorado's residents, businesses, and visitors. SACFD consistently works to achieve and/or maintain the highest professionalism and efficiency for its members.

To best serve the community, SACFD created an Accreditation Team led by Accreditation Manager/Captain David Metish, with assistance from Accreditation Specialist Amanda Foote, who conducted an extensive Community Risk Assessment (CRA) and Standards of Cover (SOC) to support and implement the 2021-2026 Strategic Plan. The strategic plan is updated annually at an executive leadership session and then re-published on the website. The CRA/SOC analyzed data from 2019-2022 and was published on the website in 2023. The first Self-Assessment Manual was completed in 2023 utilizing external Technical Advisors.

SACFD supports a unique residential, industrial, commercial, and wildland community. A vast linear boundary with numerous roads, railways, rivers, and geographical obstacles, including a national wildlife preserve and a significant refinery. These community features create unique challenges for SACFD that the department rises to meet every day. The department has a rich history of rapid growth and change, mirroring the districts. SACFD has analyzed community expectations with risk assessment, critical task analysis, available personnel, apparatus, equipment, and training for fire suppression, emergency medical services, technical rescue, hazardous material response, and wildland fire suppression. Ultimately, the analysis between benchmarks and baselines tells the story of where the department currently stands and establishes clear goals for performance maintenance, compliance, and continuous improvement. These standards are upheld department-wide, not just in operations but also in administration. Evaluation of all programs within the department is imperative for continuous improvement, including, but not limited to, information technologies, human resources, public relations, prevention, maintenance, fleet, and accreditation itself.

The foundation of accreditation resides in data. By embracing the accreditation continuous improvement model, SACFD is committed to making data-driven, evidence-based decisions to serve the community best.

The heart of SACFD has always been to innovate and continuously improve to deliver world-class service to the community. The accreditation process has cemented this mission, and the department has established a strong framework for future improvement.





Our budget funds a level of service that provides 24-hour-a-day, 7-day-a-week coverage from 6 strategically located fire stations staffed by full-time firefighters and supplemented by volunteer firefighters. Our fire department was rated by the Insurance Services Office (ISO) as a Class 2 which is one of the best ratings available. This enables us to return value to the taxpayers.

TRAINING DIVISION

Significant Training Events:

- SACFD put two new training buildings into service in 2023. The first building is a new Class A (live fire) burn building at the training grounds at Fire Station 25. The new Class A burn building resembles a single-story ranch house with a walk-out basement from the east side. When you approach the building from the west side, it replicates a two-story residential with a walk-out second floor. The building also has a burnable single-car garage.
- The second building replicates a single-story commercial structure with a cuttable overhead door. Attached is a two-story space that can be used to replicate a residential structure. This building is inside The Pound and is an all-weather training prop. While you cannot do live fire training, you can use theatrical smoke and digital fire panels to replicate fire conditions.
- Hosted the Aggressive Command Supports Aggressive Firefighting three-day seminar at The Pound. Operations Chef Nick Martin presented the course from the Salisbury, North Carolina Fire Department. The course included a one-day class open to Denver Metro Fire Departments and two days of intensive education for the SACFD line officers and chief staff.
- Hosted joint live fire training with Brighton Fire Rescue District. Crews were given a hands-on Live fire simulation at a single-family residential structure with an above and below-grade fire. Officers will assume command, conduct a 360, and declare a strategy.
- Participated in joint Wildland fire training at the Rocky Mountain Arsenal (RMA). Hands training on Brush Truck 26 with North Area Wildland Teams and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service.
- Participated in Skid Avoidance Defensive Driving Course. First Gear Driving School taught the training. The Training combines experienced coaching with hands-on experience behind the wheel of the SkidCar™ vehicle. The innovative SkidCar technology can simulate hazardous driving conditions such as slippery roads and hydroplaning.
- The South Adams County Fire Department spent six months developing a new Standard Operating Guideline and associated training to apply Pre-Determined Assignments for single-family and two-family residential structures. Training included online-based officer simulations and live training evolutions on the training ground. Pre-determined assignments were put in place as part of a concerted effort to quicken the pace on the ground regarding the placement of the first two hose lines, search for occupants, and outside ventilation duties in support of fire attack and search.
- The Training Division supported SACFD members that attended the County Fire Tactics Officer Development Program, the Mile High Firefighters Conference, Mile High Women in the Fire Service Conference, Denver FD Chop Shop, Arvada Fire Extrication Class, Tricks of the Truck Class, the Colorado State Firefighters College, Irons & Ladders Truck Class, IAFF Hazardous Materials Technician Program, Lithium Ion Battery Class, Andy Fredricks Days, Peer Support training program, ICS 300 & 400 classes for newly promoted officers.











WELLNESS AND PHYSICAL THERAPY

2023 Wellness Program:

- 1032 Physical Therapy visits both on and off-duty injuries in 2023
- 10% of overall visits were for Workers' Compensation claims
- 90% of 2023 workers' compensation claims were able to return to full duty in 2023
- 100% of the line/fleet/fire prevention completed an annual physical, including a functional movement screen to assess overall mobility and injury prevention
- Additional gym equipment purchased for the Pound Training Facility gym in preparation for multidepartment academies in 2024
- Rehabilitation recovery equipment purchased for all personnel to utilize through the physical therapy office, various stations, and the training facility gym
- The Peer Fitness Trainer (PFT) team implemented a new functional physical ability test (FPAT) for all line personnel, which tests various on-the-job fire skills and tasks
- The Peer Fitness Trainer (PFT) team was able to have an additional 4 members join their team and go through certification training
- The Peer Support team was able to add additional members to their team and go through extensive training

EMS DIVISION

2023 was the inaugural year for advanced life support (ALS) at the South Adams County Fire Department! Starting January 1, 2023, two SACFD fire apparatus provided this service. In addition to the firefighters/EMTs, at least one firefighter/paramedic was present during each emergency response from these two units.

The benefit provided by these paramedics was enhanced medical knowledge and capabilities ranging from additional medications to advanced procedures that allowed for higher levels of care for their patients on scene and in conjunction with the stellar care administered during ambulance transport by our Platte Valley Ambulance partners. In addition to the monthly EMS continuing education for all field providers, each SACFD paramedic completed a clearance process to demonstrate high competency at the ALS level, culminating in a fourhour comprehensive practical examination.

Over the year, our ALS and BLS level providers worked seamlessly as a team and with our partners from Platte Valley Ambulance Service to deliver the highest quality emergency medical care to our district's citizens and visitors!
